From the Chief Rabban



Dear Nobles and Ladies.

Management consultant Peter Drucker, PhD, once described leadership as being about follower-ship. I think when people think or contemplate about leadership they think of a job title, in freemasonry it's a title of a position.

Being assertive, having a "position" or even charismatic isn't actual leadership. So, when we think about our fraternity and El Kalah what is leadership? I think we can look at leadership as the outcome the person gets from the actions they do. For example, we can look at the outcomes of forming a new club in St. George and adding new Nobles to our ranks last year as a sign of leadership. Leadership is what the Central Shrine Club came up with, to try and see if they could figure out if the Kelly Grove Pavilion could be viable and profitable long term and if not, then what to do with it next, and coming before the Divan and then Nobles to put that plan into motion! The Hogan group (Hogan, R., Curphy, G., Kaiser, R., & Chamorro-Premuzic, T. (2018). Leadership in Organizations.) tells us that "leadership style is affected by a leader's performance across four leadership domains." Those four domains are: **Intrapersonal** – handling pressure, challenge, and learning; **Interpersonal** – facilitating communication and connections; **Operational** – driving results, accountability, and structure; and **Strategic** – creating vision and strategy for the future. As Hogan goes on to say "If effective leadership is like mountain climbing, then many routes exist to reach the summit. Individual leaders have a combination of strengths that produce a rich and complex interplay among the

domains." You will see these domains of leadership among many of the elected Divan members. It is understanding the difference between leadership and management that leads between a good year and a great year for us in El Kalah. The five-year plan that has been developed, and started in 2019, is one of leadership and not management. It allows for the ability that no leader is a manager but a leader because all leaders rely on all members of the elected Divan, so we can have continuation of what we have been working on, and so it continues into the future, just as we embody what we have learned from the Utah Grand Lodge! From the Board of Governors



Greetings All!

Over the next several months I will be highlighting portions of the 2022 annual letter to the staff of Shriners Children's, Salt Lake City from Dr. Carroll, Chief of Staff. As you will see 2022 was a year of challenge, change

and success. I hope you keep the staff, their patients and families in your thoughts and prayers throughout this year.

With the help of our departmental leaders, here is a synopsis of our accomplishments in 2022 as an outpatient facility:

From Jenna and Kristen: Surgery

Our Surgical volumes at Primary Children's Hospital continue to rise through the year. High census due to viral infections (COVID, RSV and flu) curtailed activity in January and February and again in December, but despite this, we completed surgery on many of our children, and were still able to protect them from severe financial strain.

This year our three Shriners physicians did roughly 300 surgeries on our Shriners children. In addition, Drs. Hennessey and Woiczik did nearly 400 cases on call so we could maintain our privileges at Primary Children's Hospital. In addition, many of these 'on call' children eventually became Shriners patients. Our subcontracted physician partners from the University of Utah did 250 cases.

In addition to surgery, over 50 children had bisphosphonate infusions for their fragile bone done at the Rapid Therapy Unit at Primary Children's Hospital. These were kids with not only osteogenesis imperfecta but also muscular dystrophy and other chronic conditions that decreases their bone mass. This took tremendous coordination, and I am incredibly grateful to Wade Walter, Emily Tyler and our MD associates who helped these kids get the life changing care they needed at Primary Children's Hospital with Shriners backing.

Stay tuned folks for more from the amazing staff of Shriners Children's.
